

Policy statement

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Autonomy

World Physiotherapy advises that physiotherapists, as autonomous professionals, should have the freedom to exercise their professional judgment and decision making, wherever they practice, within the physiotherapist's knowledge, competence and scope of practice.

Physiotherapists operate as independent practitioners, as well as members of health service provider teams, and are subject to the World Physiotherapy ethical responsibilities and the codes of ethics and best practice in the country in which they practise. They are able to act as first contact practitioners, and patients/clients may seek direct services without referral from another health professional.¹ The services provided by physiotherapists include health promotion, prevention, examination/assessment, evaluation, diagnosis, interventions/treatments and outcomes assessment. The actions of individual physiotherapists are their own responsibility, and their professional decisions cannot be controlled or compromised by employers, members of other professions or other individuals.

In addition to recognising the autonomy of the physiotherapist, World Physiotherapy's description of physiotherapy states that ethical responsibilities require a physiotherapist to recognise the autonomy of the patient/client or legal guardian in seeking his or her services.(1)

World Physiotherapy encourages its member organisations to support and work toward:

- assurance that entry level physiotherapy professional education requirements meet the World Physiotherapy education framework recommendations (2)
- recognition by national governments and other professionals of physiotherapists as autonomous professionals (3)
- · patients/clients having direct access to physiotherapists and their services through self-referral
- implementation of procedures that support responsible self-governance of physiotherapists (4)
